SUN SAFETY AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

More than 15,900 new cases of skin cancer are diagnosed in the UK every year.

With that in mind, this summer we've relaunched our skin cancer campaign and armed with our giant deck chair, Sun Safety Guides and plenty of SunSense sun screens, we've taken to the streets to educate the public on keeping safe in the sun and preventing skin cancer.

Our giant deck chair made its debut at Liverpool John Lennon Airport as travellers and lucky holiday makers made sure to get a snap and grab some free sun screen before their flight. A few weeks later we hit the road and headed for Lancaster city centre, where we made sure our giant deck chair had pride of place on the Lancaster Plinth in Market Square and spoke to the public about the importance of protecting their skin from UV damage.

During the August bank holiday weekend, we were at Chavasse Park in Liverpool One and we couldn't have picked a better day for it. With scorching weather, we made sure to top up our own sun screen often as the deck chair proved a huge hit with shoppers. Nobody left empty handed as we provided everyone with our Sun Safety Guides and Sun Sense sun screen.



As part of the campaign we have also re-introduced our Sun Safety Pledge, a joint initiative between ourselves and Public Health Liverpool designed to encourage employers to put their outdoor workers' safety front of mind by raising awareness of the importance of using adequate sun protection while working outside.

Amongst those signing up to the pledge this year were Liverpool John Lennon Airport, who have over 100 operational staff working outdoors on a daily basis, Magenta Living, the largest housing provider in the Wirral with 200 outdoor workers and Stewart Milne Homes, one of the largest housebuilders in the North West with 70 staff working outdoors daily.

An online toolkit was made available to the businesses and their staff with advice including covering up and using sun screen between May and September, paying particular attention to exposed areas such as ears, neck and lips.













We are proud to be supported by SunSense. SunSense sunscreens provide the highest SPF available, offering both UVA & UVB protection. Liverpool College pupils have also gotten in on the sun safety action, taking part in a specialised assembly to get them ready for the summer holidays. We worked with the Pre Prep school in Mossley Hill to educate over 200 pupils on how to protect themselves from the sun's UV rays when spending time outdoors, as well as giving them some information to take home to their families to show how to check moles using the NHS ABCDE guidance.

By starting in schools, North West Cancer Research hopes to arm the younger generation with the relevant information about sun safety and encourage a positive association with sun cream application.

Our campaign also took us to Llanrwst in North Wales for the National Eisteddfod festival; a celebration of the culture and language in Wales. We encouraged visitors to check out the difference sun screen can make in protecting your skin with a few snaps in front of our UV camera. Working alongside Bangor University, we also had a few cell slides straight from the lab that visitors could inspect through microscopes to see the different stages of cancer growth.

Our Sun Safety Accessory Kits were a big hit with kids who could choose to make a keyring or bracelet with UV sensitive beads that glow under the sun's rays. We made sure to supply our craft-makers with some sun screen to keep topping up throughout the festival.

IMPROVING THE TREATMENT OF HEAD & NECK CANCER

NWCR is funding scientists at the University of Liverpool to identify how to improve the effectiveness of head and neck cancer treatments.

The funding comes as rates rise across the region. In the North West alone, around 1,100 people a year are diagnosed with head and neck cancer and in Liverpool you are three times more likely to be diagnosed with this type of cancer than anywhere else in the UK. In general, men are also three times more likely to develop head and neck cancers than women.

Symptoms of head and neck cancers can often be mistaken for more common illnesses, which mean that many cases are already advanced by the time they're diagnosed, making treatment more difficult.

We've funded £200k into a three-year research project which will seek to improve treatment outcomes for those types of head and neck cancers which are more difficult to treat.

The research team, headed by Dr Jason Parsons, has already discovered the mechanisms through which certain types of head and neck cancers respond well to proven radiotherapy treatments. Now the team are turning their focus toward the majority of cancers which don't respond well to treatment and to identify new, more effective strategies in combination with radiotherapy.

Dr Parsons and his team are using innovative 3D models of head and neck cancers to mimic the behaviour of the original tumour and see how they respond to radiotherapy and drug combinations. Importantly, this work is focussed on proton beam therapy, which is a targeted cancer treatment.

Dr Parsons said: "The funding from NWCR will allow us to make important advances in our understanding of the effects that radiotherapy treatments, particularly proton beam therapy, can have on head and neck cancer cells.

"We are working to make what we hope will be new and significant discoveries to develop more effective treatments for patients, leading to improved prognosis. Head and neck cancer is the sixth most common cancer in the UK and here in the North West rates are rising at an alarming rate, which is why it's crucial that we keep working towards finding the best treatments for this type of cancer."

SOUTHPORT AFTERNOON TEA


Southport Committee is once again celebrating after another successful Afternoon Tea, their most popular annual event, which this year raised £1,650 toward local research.

It is with much sorrow that we report the death of Mrs Olivia Ley on 25th May 2019. Olivia was a Vice-President of NWCR and a former Chair of the Lunesdale Branch and had been a voluntary helper in the Lune Valley for over 40 years.

Olivia was born in Egypt on 2nd September 1933 into an Army family stationed in the Middle East until 1935 when they returned home to the Lune Valley. With the outbreak of the Second World War, Olivia's father rejoined the Army and the family moved to Farnborough to be near relations.

After leaving school at sixteen, Olivia spent a year in Switzerland and became fluent in French. On returning to England, she met and married Peter Maude and in 1951 they were living in Cheshire on the outskirts of Manchester. Within two years, Olivia's first daughter, Sarah, was born. However, tragedy struck three years later when her husband Peter was returning home from a business trip to Iran. The aircraft crashed on coming in to land at Manchester killing Peter and all twenty passengers on board.

Olivia and her daughter moved to Bowden and started to make new friends in Cheshire. She met a serving officer, Brigadier Hugh Ley, and in due course were married in May 1961. They moved to Paris where her second daughter, Miranda, was born. The next move was to Lymm in Cheshire, then Altcar near Formby, where they lived until her husband retired, at which point they returned to the Lune Valley and lived in Burrow.

In 1976 Olivia became involved with the Lunesdale Branch in a modest way as a volunteer distributing and picking up collecting boxes. Over the years she became more involved with the activities of the branch and joined the branch committee. She was appointed Vice-Chairman in 1992 and Chairman in 2005.

For many years Olivia had been the branch representative and together with Wendy Hadwin attended the charity's quarterly board meetings in Liverpool. The branch was very successful at fundraising in the majority of the villages in the Lune Valley, thereby contributing substantially to the funds of the charity.



After ten years of successful leadership of the Lunesdale Branch, Olivia decided that the time had come to hand over the chairmanship for health reasons. She was very well known in the Lune Valley, a keen tennis player and a Lady Captain and subsequently a Lady President of Kirkby Lonsdale Golf Club. She supported a number of local charities and was much loved by the people who worked with her and those who benefitted from her charitable work. Tunstall Parish Church was very important to her and she served as a church warden for a number of years.

Olivia was a great enthusiast, full of fun and wonderfully persuasive. Consequently, NWCR and other charities benefitted hugely. On her retirement as Chairman of the Lunesdale Branch, Olivia was appointed a Vice-President of NWCR in recognition of her work for the charity over a very long period.

We all have our memories of a truly lovely person, who will be greatly missed by all who knew her, especially those in the Lune Valley.


