EARLY LUNG CANCER DETECTION

A Blackpool based researcher has completed a two-year trial of new technology designed to predict the likelihood of lung cancer developing.

Dr Danielle Bury and her team at Blackpool Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust have been testing a sensor-based technology which analyses a small volume of saliva using a diamond spectroscopy device. The saliva swab is placed against the diamond sensor and light passing through interacts with chemical bonds to generate a fingerprint spectrum.

This data is then explored mathematically for features and results that correlate with CT scans obtained through the national lung cancer screening programme. The team used this data to build a predictive model of saliva analysis and have been able to continue testing for accuracy on a wider range of samples.

Danielle said: "Early diagnosis of lung cancer vastly improves prognosis and survival. An early, predictive detection method has vast potential as an inexpensive and high output alternative.

"The aim was to base our sensor in a clinical setting or in an adjacent lab. We mostly achieved this and when samples needed to be taken off site they were transported stably to the lab. Our other aim was for a scientific researcher to liaise with the frontline clinical team to easily facilitate the identification, consent and obtaining of saliva samples from the cohort of 2000 individuals. We achieved this and all samples were analysed, and the data then interrogated. "The results of the project suggest our fast and non-invasive approach can identify underlying lung cancer. Results were achieved with high accuracy, alongside high sensitivity and specificity (all > 90%). For a pilot study this is an exceptional outcome. The work has been published in peer-reviewed journals and laid the basis for several new projects, with many more in the pipeline. We're pleased to also report that the recruitment portion of our trial has been adopted into the National Institute for Health and Care Research portfolio and will be transformative for the clinical trials landscape nationally."

TEAM FC'S 50 MILE CYCLE

A group of friends from across the North West have taken on a 50 mile cycle in aid of life-saving cancer research projects.

Tony, Simon, Chris and Criss took it upon themselves to band together and organise their own cycle route when the event they had originally signed up for was cancelled.

The group started at Albert Dock in Liverpool before heading toward Everton FC's Goodison Park, through Aintree Racecourse and on to Southport through the fields of Ormskirk. For the final stretch in Southport, they took in the sights along the prom before stopping for a quick lunch.

The sun shone on the group for their jaunt back to Liverpool, where they kept to the coastal path through Formby and Crosby, taking in the sights of the Anthony Gormley iron men statues. They were greeted by friends and family back at Albert Dock, completing their 50 miles and celebrating with a pint.

The group originally decided to take on the Liverpool Chester bike ride together to commemorate the hospitals at which Tony had received cancer treatment and eventually the all clear. Unfortunately, in the weeks leading up to their new cycling plan, Tony had been told his cancer was back.

Tony was determined more than ever that the news wasn't going to beat him and kept fit and positive, completing the ride with great enthusiasm. Along with his friends they have raised a brilliant £2,500.



Tony said: "After our original ride was cancelled, we decided we wanted to stay in Merseyside and start from a similar location, and we had to do the full 50 miles, as that's what we had told everyone we were doing!

"The route was fabulous, out through the countryside and back along the coast. Chris, being an Ormskirk local, became our tour guide and Simon was the designated map reader – we only took a few minor detours and missed turns! There were some issues navigating over tree roots and around bushes. The guys thought it was hilarious when I came a cropper slipping on a muddy section of a canal towpath! "I was determined to get through this cycle with a smile on my face. I think the main image people have of cancer sufferers is of misery and pain, but without a positive and optimistic mindset, I couldn't get through it. The bike ride and raising money gave me a focus instead of my own cancer.

"I'm currently sitting in the chemo ward having my treatment and the laughter and joking going on really belies the idea of cancer being miserable. The nurses, staff and patients all raise the mood and that's why we have the best NHS care and treatment - it's a good reason to raise money and help North West Cancer Research find better treatments."



BLOCK THE SUN, NOT THE FUN!

Our latest campaign has been shining a spotlight on the region's skin cancer rates.

We've been rallying children across the region to remind their grown-ups to stay safe in the sun, both at home and abroad with our latest on the road campaign – Block the Sun, Not the Fun.

We visited family hotspots across the region including Greenwood Family Park, Cheshire Ice Cream Farm, Tatton Park, and Hoghton Tower to encourage visitors to keep applying their sunscreen even when staying in the UK and help reduce their risk of developing skin cancer.

While there, we gave out handy handbag sized sunscreen bottles and chatted with visitors about their current sun safety habits, as well as what they can do to protect themselves from skin cancer in the future.

The campaign also featured Facebook adverts including children of the region posing as a news anchor, roving reporter and weatherman – with the message to grown ups that they should also be protecting themselves from the sun, not just the kids!

LOCAL NEWS Supporting the campaign was Mike Whalen from Birkdale, who has been diagnosed twice with melanoma. The first instance came about when Mike noticed a recurring scab on his ear. After being prescribed a cream by his GP that had no effect, 18 months later Mike requested to be referred to a specialist.

After a consultation and some tests with the specialist, Mike was diagnosed with the early stages of melanoma. His treatment involved surgery to remove the affected portion of his ear.

Three years later Mike noticed a strange indentation on his cheek and, given his history, was vigilant in being tested and was soon diagnosed, once again, with melanoma. Another surgery was on the cards to remove the cancerous area, and he has since been discharged.

Mike said: "I'm very conscious of what the future might hold and I'm very aware to keep checking and aware to put sunscreen on.

"I tell my friends if there's anything even slightly untoward to get it checked out. Early detection really can save your life."

Emma and Natalie, from Morecambe, set their sights on scaling the highest peaks in Scotland, England and Wales, in memory of a close friend and to honour family members currently undergoing treatment for cancer.

The duo took to Ben Navis, Scafell Pike and Snowdon with determination, conquering almost 10,000 feet of elevation and navigating rugged terrain and unpredictable weather to raise vital funds for cancer research projects across the North West and North Wales.

Despite the tough physical demands, the two friends completed the challenge with 16 minutes to spare at 23 hours, 44 minutes, making their achievement all the more remarkable. The friends updated their supporters along the way with pictures from their journey and raised an amazing E1,300 toward life-saving research.

The duo were inspired to take on the challenge by their late friend Laura, who passed away from secondary breast cancer in 2020. While living with cancer, Laura made it her mission to do as much fundraising as possible for local cancer charities, even organising an event in which 60 of her family and friends took on the Ullswater Way in 2019. Laura's determination inspired Emma and Natalie to continue fundraising in her memory.



The pair said: "After completing the Yorkshire Peaks in 2022, we were ready for our next challenge to be a step up and give people a reason to sponsor us.

"The National Three Peaks challenge was brutal and we're so proud we completed it in the time we did, as it didn't seem possible at various points. We're so grateful to all who sponsored us, shared our story and sent messages. It meant a lot and really made it all worthwhile.

"We have both had family members diagnosed or receiving treatment for cancer this year, and we wanted to pick a local charity that we know will impact research in the area we live in. We wanted to try and continue fundraising in memory of Laura too – she raised so much for cancer research and remains our inspiration."

Not to be deterred, they continued on to Bangor and crossed the Menai Bridge to Anglesey.

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The group enjoyed support along their journey, with a special stop at The Anglesey Circuit where they drummed up more donations as they took to the track on their bikes.

SCIENTIFIC **SYMPOSIUM 2024**

The new, revamped North West Cancer Research Scientific Symposium has returned for another annual outing, this time being held at the Yoko Ono Lennon Centre at Liverpool University.

Over 90 people attended, from academic and clinical staff, post doc and post grad to Charity staff and supporters. Throughout the day, seventeen professors, doctors and clinicians from institutions across the region gave in-depth insights into their projects including exciting updates and breakthroughs.

Also joining the cohort for the day was Steve Bland, husband of the late BBC journalist and broadcaster Rachael Bland, who spoke about how his wife tackled her journey with cancer.

An awards ceremony was held to round off the day, with winners of poster and speed talk competitions awarded by Charity CEO, Alastair Richards.

LANCASTER PREHABILITATION PROJECT

A team of researchers at Lancaster University Medical School, led by Dr Christopher Gaffney, are seeking to determine if prehabilitation promotes an improvement in brain health in colorectal cancer patients who receive chemotherapy.

The team has previously tested a orehabilitation intervention that involves nutritional support and an exercise plan prior to surgery, which showed improvements in fitness and reduced hospital stays.

They are now expanding their project and testing whether this intervention can also prevent 'chemo brain' – a common side effect of chemotherapy which affects memory and cognitive function. The research team will be measuring the success of using this treatment to help alleviate stress and anxiety in colorectal cancer patients, and ultimately improve their quality of life post-chemotherapy.

The researchers will assess patients by measuring proteins in their blood before and after prehabilitation that indicate the growth of new brain cells. They will also measure electrical activity of the brain, as well as thinking skills such as memory and attention.



The team plan to follow up with participants of the study three months after chemotherapy, to interview them about their physical and psychological health and quality of life.

Dr Christopher Gaffney said: "The incidence rate of colorectal cancer is 37% higher in the North West than the national average and most patients undertake chemotherapy. If successful, our intervention could help thousands of patients across the region annually and significantly improve their quality of life after treatment.

"Following our study, we will promote discussion with colleagues in the NHS regarding the type of treatment to optimise patient outcomes in colorectal cancer and ultimately inform future research into the benefits of prehabilitation, for colleagues in both neuroscience and physiology."

ENGAGING SCHOOLS AWARD

North West Cancer Research is delighted to announce that we have won the Engaging Schools Award at the School Games Impact Awards earlier this year.

The award celebrates our Happy Healthy Active schools outreach programme, delivered alongside Liverpool School Sports Partnership. The programme is designed to teach kids how to make healthy choices while having fun and getting hands on with educational experiments, and has been supported by Public Health Liverpool and Alder Hey Children's Hospital Trust.



HALTON BIKE FEST

A local motorcycle group has supported vital cancer projects in the region with a summer 'BikeFest' event.

The Custodians Motorcycle Club was formed following the death of PC Keith Palmer and encompasses all Crown Servants who place themselves in harm's way to protect others.

A teenager from Wrexham has taken on a mammoth challenge in aid of life-saving cancer research this summer.

Erin Smith, 16, completed a 70.3 mile triathlon in July, to remember loved ones her family has lost to cancer.

Erin's challenge started with a 1.9km swim at her local Total Fitness centre, before getting into gear for a lengthy 90km bike loop, finishing in the picturesque Alyn Waters country park. Finally, she took on a 21km run, the same length as a half marathon, through woodland trails and finished her challenge back at Alyn Waters. Erin completed her epic endeavour in an impressive 6 hours and 45 minutes, despite wet and windy weather!

The challenge comes in memory of Erin's Gran who she lost to cancer seven years ago, and more recently a close family friend passed after a lengthy battle with cancer.

The task also marks a distance milestone for Erin, who has completed triathlons

before which have been shorter due to her young age. She has been generously supported by family and friends, raising £1,500 for vital research.



Erin said: "In the run up to the challenge I was training whenever I could fit it in before and after school, all while revising for GCSEs too, but I still got in the hours I needed to.

"The challenge was hard and pushed me further than ever before, but those who suffer from cancer go through much more every day. I know many people are affected by the disease and I have lost many people close to me, so I want to help support the research as much as I possibly can.

A father-daughter duo from Knutsford have taken on an epic European adventure in the form of the Tour Du Mont Blanc, a four day trekking challenge across three countries, to raise funds for life-saving cancer research.

Paul and Rachel Moonan started their challenge in Courmayeur, Italy, before ascending the Val Ferret and taking in the inspiring views of Mont Blanc, before crossing over into Switzerland. Once there they took on the most challenging pass of the trek, with views of the Swiss side of the valley. The pair hiked up and over the mountains via the Bovine route to Trient, before ascending Col de Balme and finishing their adventure in Tré-le-Champ, France.

During the four-day challenge the pair stopped over in Alpine Mountain Huts and hiked between 15-20km each day, totalling 55km. In all, they climbed a whopping 10,7000 feet, all while carrying their loaded kits. The pair kept supporters updated with regular updates on their Justgiving page, raising an amazing £6,000 for vital cancer research projects across the region and have dedicated the funds in Paul's dad's name; Edmund Moonan.

Paul is a trustee for North West Cancer Research, so recognises the crucial need for cancer research and education across the North West and North Wales.

He said: "As a Trustee I have a good understanding of the excellent work the Charity does to help reduce the impacts of cancer in our region and the wider world. Rachel and I were keen to raise more money and increase the funds that we invest into this invaluable research.
