CHRISTMAS AT DUKE ST MARKET

Liverpool food and drink hub, Duke Street Market, has raised £7,800 to support life-saving cancer research projects across the North West and North Wales.

Duke Street Market is a culinary hub in the heart of Liverpool City Centre, boasting six kitchens and an independent restaurant.

The market added £1 to each bill throughout the Christmas period, and guests ordered their food and drink using the Peazi app, with an optional £1 donation added at checkout.

Lee Bannon Smith, the General Manager for Duke Street Market said: "It was a simple decision for us to choose North West Cancer Research for our Christmas 2022 fundraiser. They're an organisation from our city, serving our communities and improving health in our region. Most people in the world are affected by cancer and for us to be able to support

L®ND®N MARATHON

In April, over 40,000 runners took to the streets of London for the annual London Marathon, with a team of runners supporting North West Cancer Research among them.

Kevin White from Liverpool took on the event for the first time and decided to add a challenging twist - completing an additional cycling challenge on his way to the capital.

Kevin, who smashed his fundraising target of £2,000 and raised a staggering £7,280, cycled from his home in Liverpool to London, before donning a 40lb backpack to run the London Marathon course.

The cycle to the capital, which took three days, included two overnight stops in Shawbury and Cirencester to recuperate after tackling at least 100 miles each day. Kevin's route saw him set off in Liverpool and pass through locations including Northwich, Shrewsbury and the Cotswolds before he took to the streets of London for one of the world's biggest marathons.

Kevin said: "I'm so grateful for the support that's flooded in from friends, family and coworkers. It's brilliant to be able to raise so much for such a vital cause and help make a difference to the future of cancer in our region. We recently lost a close family member to lung cancer and felt really supported by the cancer care system throughout, so it means a lot to me and my family to be able to give back."

Another runner taking on the Marathon for the first time was Paul Jones from Wallasey, who was inspired by his dad's battle with cancer.

Paul's dad, Keith, was diagnosed with mesothelioma late last year and is currently receiving immunotherapy treatment in Liverpool. Mesothelioma is a type of cancer that develops in the lining that covers the outer surface of some of the body's organs. Support flooded in from friends, family and colleagues for Paul, who raised an amazing £2,500 as he kept his sponsors up to date with his training on Strava.

Paul said: "I learned about North West Cancer Research around the time of my dad's diagnosis, and how the Charity plays a vital role in supporting the region's delivery of support, treatment and care for those affected. To be supporting a charity that has an indirect role in helping my Dad fills me with a lot of belief and pride. To have done something that will help even more people in the future has been a great motivator."

Mother and daughter duo, Corinne and Charlotte Jones took on the Marathon to raise money toward ovarian cancer projects after Corinne's auntie was diagnosed with the disease in 2022.

The pair took on the course side by side, raising over £4,500.

Runner Chris Hall was a familiar face to the London Marathon, as he took on the challenge for the 25th time after first taking part in 1989.

Chris, from Wrexham, was inspired to raise money for cancer research after his father passed away from throat cancer over 30 years ago, at a time when there was no treatment available.

Since 2004 he has taken on a range of fundraising challenges, driven by the promising advances made in cancer research over the past three decades.

This year's challenge has been no different, as Chris has raised E2,917, bringing his total raised over the years to a whopping E38,000.

Chris said: "Being able to run the London Marathon once again is a privilege and I'm thankful I am able to do so in aid of a cause that is so important to me. I'm incredibly supportive of the research that takes place across the region, so we can all learn more about cancer and how best to treat it."

NEW PROTEIN COULD LEAD TO IMPROVED TREATMENTS

A North West Cancer Researchfunded team of researchers, based across the region, have identified a new protein in cancer cells which could lead to improved treatments for head and neck cancer and ovarian cancer patients.

The team, which is headed by Dr Christopher Staples at Bangor University, seek to build upon prior research which found that ovarian cancer patients with a certain genetic mutation (in the BRCA genes) respond well to precision medicines called PARP Inhibitors. PARP Inhibitors specifically kill cancer cells with a BRCA mutation.

Researchers in Dr Staples' laboratory have shown that the newly identified protein, named MRNIP, shares overlapping properties with BRCA proteins in that they both help cancer cells deal with chemotherapy. Some cancers have lost MRNIP, and therefore may respond well to certain anti-cancer drugs.

With support from teams at the University of Liverpool and University of Manchester, the researchers are exploring these new findings in head and neck and ovarian cancers by using gene editing technology to generate a series of cancer cell lines lacking the MRNIP gene. They will target these cells with chemotherapy, radiotherapy, and other novel anti-cancer drugs.

The team will monitor the responsiveness of the cells and link the findings with the level of DNA damage to provide a route forward for new, more effective treatments for patients. Dr Staples said: "Given that ovarian and head and neck cancers are disproportionally high in the North West, our ultimate goal is to develop new strategies to boost cancer cell killing and to improve survival rates of cancer patients in the region".

"More effective treatments for these cancers are actively being sought, particularly for those types that display resistance to chemotherapy and radiotherapy. Our research will focus on the MRNIP protein as a new target for treatment.

"Our long-term aim is to develop strategies leading to optimisation of patient treatment and improvements in long-term outcome and survival, particularly for cancer patients in the North West and North Wales."

Ovarian and head and neck cancers are among the top ten cancers that occur disproportionately in the North West, with incidences of patients with head and neck cancers 3.5 times the national average, and rates of ovarian cancer in Flintshire, Gwynedd and Anglesey are between 29 and 38% higher than the rest of Wales.





If you spot any signs, or have any concerns, please book an appointment with your GP.

OVARIAN CANCER

Anyone with ovaries can get ovarian cancer, but it mostly affects those over 50. Some symptoms can be missed so it's important to know the signs.

- A frequent swollen tummy or feeling bloated
- Pain or tenderness in the tummy or between hios
- No appetite or feeling full quicklu
- An urgent need to wee or going more often
- Indigestion, constipation or diarrhoea
- Back pain
- Feeling tired all the time
- Unintentional weight loss
- Vaginal bleeding after menopause



Many of these symptoms will not be head and neck cancer, but seeing your GP can rule it out and give you piece of mind.

HEAD AND NECK CANCER

There are more than 30 areas within the head and neck where cancer can develop. Make sure you know the signs and symptoms.

- Persistent hoarseness or coughing
- Difficulty or pain when swallowing
- Shortness of breath
- Lump or swelling in the neck, iaw or mouth
- A persistent blocked nose (usually only affecting one side)
- Nosebleeds
- Decreased sense of smell
- Numbness or drooping in part of your face

FUNDRAISING AT THE BEDFORD

The team from a Rock Ferry pub, The Bedford, also known locally as Luke's, have been on a fundraising mission across 2022 and into 2023, with a calendar of fundraising events and challenges.

The team kicked off the fundraising in early 2022 with a LFC Speaker's Evening featuring LFC Legend Phil Thompson, organised alongside friend of the pub and long time patron Dave Grice. Tickets sold out for the popular event, which raised £1,600.

Not content on stopping there, Pub Manager, Stephen Davies, rallied his staff and patrons to get involved and raise as much as possible for local cancer research.

Customer and friend of The Bedford, Chris Bedford, took on a belated Santa Dash in April 2022 after a head injury a few years earlier delayed his planned fundraising.

Inspired by Chris' physical challenge, Danielle Taylor, Becky Robinson and Luke Saddington took on the Charity's own Cycle of Hope in June 2022, cycling 60km around Lancashire and Merseyside countryside, raising in excess of £200.

After a successful Cycle, the sky was the limit for a team of twelve including customers and staff, who soared to 15,000ft for their own skydive in October 2022. The daredevil team raised over £7,000 with their fearless fundraiser.

Rounding off the year full circle, The Bedford hosted another LFC Speaker's Evening in March 2023, this time with LFC Legend Jan Molby and comedian Jedd Stone, bringing the overall fundraising total to over £10,000.

Stephen Davies, Pub Manager, said: "As a local, family-run community pub it's always been important to us to give back to the community and charity in particular.

"North West Cancer Research is the ideal charity for us, as the Charity was founded locally and we know that cancer rates are higher in our area. We have had several customers and staff affected by cancer in the last few years so it's a cause close to all our hearts and we feel so fortunate to be able to help out.

"The fundraising activities have been fantastic and we are grateful to North West Cancer Research to have enabled us to take part in so many great events. The common goal of supporting the charity has brought us all closer as a communitu."



FEARLESS FUNDRAISERS SWIM WITH SHARKS

A team of five fearless fundraisers have made a splash by taking on a sponsored Shark Dive.

The fundraisers travelled from all over the North West to Blue Planet Aquarium in Ellesmere Port for the thrilling fundraiser, getting up close and cage-free with Europe's largest collection of sharks.

After two hours of safety training, including equipment use and an introduction to the different species, the group took to the tank.

In pairs, the divers encountered 10 feet long Sand Tiger Sharks, Moray Eels, Southern Stingrays and Bamboo Sharks.

Dare-devil divers included John Barrowcliff from Wallasey and his father-in-law lan Lamb. John said: "The Shark Dive was an incredible experience. I'm not really a huge fan of swimming and always avoid it where I can, so the diving part alone was enough to get me nervous and adding sharks to the mix made it all the more challenging! The team at Blue Planet made us all feel extremely comfortable with our training session and by the time we got in the tank mu nerves were comoletely gone.

"I didn't know until recently how much more likely it is for people living in the North West to be diagnosed with cancer, and the fact that North West Cancer Research are directly tackling that issue makes them such a worthwhile cause in my eyes. If I can contribute in any way to helping advance research, then it's worth swimming with sharks!"

The event marks the first of its kind for the Charity, and together the group have raised over £3,000, all of which will go to funding cancer research and education projects across the North West and North Wales.

An extra special participant for the charity was our very own CEO, Alastair Richards, who said: "There was a lot more to consider than I expected taking on the Shark Dive. I had never been diving before so once you're in the water the first thing to think about was breathing. Once I had mastered that and planted my feet firmly on the ground, it was great!

"The sharks were curious and would swim close by for a look. Being in the water with them really made you realise just how big they are – and how many teeth they have!

"I would like to thank the other brave fundraisers that joined me on the day and got up close with our fearsome friends in the tank. Their sponsorship will help to pay for vital research to tackle the cause, improve the care and find the cure for cancer. It was a very different experience for all of us, and one that we certainly won't forget!"

Three life-saving projects have been funded by the estate of the late Miss Margaret Hopwood, totalling £652,994.

Margaret's legacy gift will support teams at Lancaster University, University of Liverpool and Bangor University as they work on projects that will improve breast cancer treatments, analyse tumour growth and study the 'Warburg Effect' respectively.

Margaret, from Preston, was a very private person who was much devoted to her parents and loyal to a small group of friends. With a love of culture, Margaret had an extensive library and a love of cooking.

She spent much of her life at the family firm in Bamber Bridge and following the passing of her parents, travelled extensively across Europe, documenting her many trips.

After inheriting her parent's wealth, Margaret stipulated in her own will that the funds should be used to study 'the cause of cancer with particular reference to protoplasm and anerobic conditions'.

Margaret's legacy will have a huge impact on the outlook of cancer research and treatments for our region and help to save countless lives.





BLACK JACK AND BOW TIE ARE BACK

A Wallasey based fundraising Committee have put their fundraising caps back on after a prolonged break due to the pandemic.

The Black Jack and Bow Tie Committee, who have been supporting the Charity with fundraising events since 2006, have come back in stule with a bio New Year's bash.

Over 120 people came together for the New Year's celebrations, and enjoyed a raffle, lively disco and a bit of bubbly, raising £1.761 in the process.

In June, Committee member Les Henderson took to Penrhun Quarry in Wales for the world's fastest zip line.

Having been gifted the experience as a Christmas present, Les decided to make it all the more worthwhile and turned it into a fundraiser, raising over £700.

FAMILY FUNIN KELSALL

The ever popular Kelsall Family Fun Day returned in May, for a day of festivities and fundraising.

The event, which has been running for 45 years, welcomed people from across West Cheshire and included a dance show, games and crafts, lively entertainment, plant stalls and a barbeque. As ever, the crowds gathered to watch as the Committee crowned the May Queen of the year, a longstanding tradition.

The event was a roaring success with brilliant weather, raising £1,750 which was added to the Committee's fundraising pot, topping them up to £6,000 for the year.



Caregivers with Cancer Project

A team of North West Cancer Research funded researchers are exploring the psychological impact of cancer diagnoses on informal caregivers.

Professor Nick Hulbert-Williams from Edge Hill University's Department of Psychology, along with Dr Brooke Swash from University of Chester, and Professor Valerie Morrison at Bangor University are leading the project, with Lorraine Wright from Edge Hill University appointed as the PhD student supporting.

Together the team have set out to understand the lived experiences of informal caregivers after receiving a cancer diagnosis, with the aim of producing a toolkit to aid cancer care professionals in their patient support.

1 in 8 adults in the UK are informal carers, with two thirds over the age of 65. This age group accounts for 60% of UK cancer diagnoses and the North West has higher proportions of carers compared to the national average. Being diagnosed with cancer whilst undertaking this role brings additional challenges to the caregiver. This research aims to better understand the care and support that is provided to people with cancer who have caregiving responsibilities, as well as the physical and psychological impact on the person they are caring for.

The first step of the project included a systematic literature review to understand what is already known about the experiences of informal caregivers, who are themselves unwell, and highlight any gaps in knowledge. Findings so far confirm that little research has been carried out on this topic, with limited evidence showing an impact not only on the caregiving role but also the psychological wellbeing and quality of life of the caregiver.

The team are now underway with a series of interviews and discussion groups, exploring the experiences of the caregiver with cancer, the person they are caring for and healthcare professionals involved in the delivery of cancer care.

Following this they will develop a toolkit to help cancer care professionals better support their patients with caregiving responsibilities. The toolkit will be developed with involvement from patients, carers and health professionals.

Prof Hulbert-Williams said: "The North West and North Wales have high prevalence of cancers with poorer prognosis and high treatment burden. Informal caregiving has increased faster than population growth across England, including in the North West, which has one of the highest percentages of local population providing informal care in England.

"This project will provide novel insights into the experiences and the challenges faced trying to navigate cancer recovery whilst maintaining caregiving responsibilities. It will help us to understand the impact of cancer diagnosis in someone with caregiving responsibilities and what support they need, and ultimately enable us to develop the right tools to help."





BLACKBURN SCHOOL'S CHRISTMAS CAROL FUNDRAISER



Westholme, a top independent school in Pleasington, has raised over £1,200 to support cancer research and education in the North West.

The school, which hosted a carol service at Blackburn Cathedral in the run up to Christmas, has donated £1,244 – the proceedings of their service collection, to support vital cancer research and education across the North West.

The service was led by The Very Reverend Peter Howell-Jones and included traditional lessons, prayers, and a repertoire of carols, solos and performances by the impressive school orchestra and popular swing band.

AUDREY'S PIER WALK IN BANGOR

Audrey McSorley, from Bangor, has taken on a sponsored walk of Bangor Garth Pier, raising money for life-saving cancer research across the North West and North Wales.

Audrey, who has previously suffered a serious stroke and has difficulties walking and talking, took on the challenge to commemorate the 127th Birthday of the Pier, which is the second longest in Wales.

Accompanied by her friends, Linda, Michelle, Brian and Steve, Audrey completed her walk in just over an hour, despite a grey and drizzly day with winds fighting against her on the way up, raising £464 which was split between North West Cancer Research and the Erionds of Bangor Garth Pier.



CYCLISTS GET BACK IN THE SADDLE

Cyclists from across the region have saddled up once again for Cycle of Hope, raising a massive £20,000. The annual event saw a total of 87 people cycle through Merseyside and West Lancashire to help raise funds for our vital work.

Featuring a choice of two routes – 60km and 60 miles-long – the Cycle of Hope has become a staple in North West Cancer Research's calendar for the last three years, with more than £80,000 having been raised to date.

Among those taking part was a team of researchers from Lancaster University who collectively raised over £700 in sponsorship.

Andrew Fielding, Senior Lecturer in cancer research at the university, was joined by colleagues from the Department of Biomedical and Life Sciences to complete the cycle. The team are currently working on a breast cancer project, developing new treatments for triple negative breast cancer.

Andrew said: "The charity supports a lot of research in our department, and at Lancaster University more widely, so we thought this would be a great opportunity to give something back.

"It was a fantastic day riding together through the lanes of Merseyside and Lancashire and, although some of the steep hills were certainly challenging, we'd trained in the run up to the event and we were able to power through.

"We're already looking forward to next year's event and are hoping to recruit more of the team to take part with us!"



GARDENS OF LLANFAIRFECHAN

The Llanfairfechan, Aber and Bangor fundraising committee have once again held their popular Open Gardens event, with nine residents of Upper Valley Road in Llanfairfechan opening their gardens to the public, raising £1,391.

OUR HOME CAMPAIGN




Our incredible region is made up of iconic landmarks and brilliant people that you won't find anywhere else. But the same goes for our rates of cancer. Living in the North West you are 25% more likely to be diagnosed with cancer than elsewhere in the UK.

That's why we launched the Our Home campaign earlier this year – to raise awareness about how our region is affected by cancer, and highlight the cancer inequalities in our communities.

We kicked off the campaign by visiting Crosby Beach in Liverpool, creating 'neighbours' for the famous Antony Gormley's Iron Men. We installed six temporary versions of the famous figures, whose bodies were emblazoned with stats relating to the shocking rates of five common cancers across the region.

The new additions stood in place alongside one of Gormley's real statues, looking out to the horizon and standing in solidarity on the path to a cancer-free future. News of the Iron Men stunt reached an audience of 51 million, with coverage including BBC North West Tonight, ITV News and various local newspapers.

The campaign was supported with a brand film and social media adverts, featuring people of our region and iconic landmarks to tell the Charity's mission and highlight the work we are doing to fight cancer inequalities. This garnered 7.5k views across social media and 1.5 million video views on Youtube and Connected TV.





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SUPPORT FROM SWINTON LIONS

HAPPY HEALTHY ACTIVE!

North West Cancer Research is proud to announce that we are working alongside Liverpool School Sports Partnership (LSSP) to deliver our Happy Healthy Active programme to around 40 primary schools across Liverpool.

The innovative programme comprises a number of creative and engaging sessions that will give children the knowledge and insight needed to make healthy life choices, as well as the confidence to adopt healthu behaviours and thrive throughout their lives.

Including sessions on healthy eating and lifestyle choices, staying safe in the sun and exciting science experiments, the sessions will enable children to get to grips with health in a fun way. Getting hands on will help them to explore the science behind the important messages, rather than lecturing them, which can be ineffective.
